- FREEMASONRY IS A RELIGION


It's a Duck Because it Quacks

- 1. The argument for religiosity if plain in pointing out things inherited from the Catholic/Anglican Guilds, such as deacons, chaplains, altar, but that does not prove it is a religion.
- 2. Rather, the plainest evidence of Freemasonry being a religion is that the founding document of its Mother Grand Lodge explicitly calls itself a 'Universal religion' and the 'Center of Union'.
- 3. Freemasonry incorporates syncretism; meaning that it has an established religious belief system that incorporates elements, practices, and traditions from other religions into itself

- FREEMASONRY IS A RELIGION

Freemasonry is a Religion in Common Form

- 1. Posits that there is a God or gods
- 2. Posits a Moral Law
- 3. Offers sacraments or the means for their members to draw nearer to God/the gods or the means for personal betterment
- Intends for those sacraments or means to lead to a life after death
- 5. Has the ability on a global or local level to enforce or normalize tradition, regularity, moral law, and orthodoxy through an authority figure(s) and/or by means of a magisterial interpretation of a sacred text.



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The Arguments from Freemasons that Freemasonry is *not* a religion

Freemasonry does not have a dogma or theology

Freemasonry does not have a magisterium to enforce orthodoxy

reemasonry does not confer sacraments

Freemasonry does not claim to offer a path to salvation by works, secret knowledge, or by any other means

Freemasonry professes a named God (Grand Architect of the Universe) that it obliges its members to refer to their God as

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Freemasonry has a Moral Law that obliges all of its members to obey. The consequence of not obeying Ma-sonic moral law may lead to either suspension or expulsion following the summary judgment of their Grand Master or by a trial in their lodge,

Freemasonry does not have a magisterium to enforce orthodoxy

Grand Lodges act as a magisterial body through which they enforce the tradition, regularity, moral law, and orthodoxy through the mechanism of granting or with-drawing recognition from other Grand Lodges.

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Freemasonry does not confer sacraments

Freemasonry has Sacraments through which their mysteries and beliefs are conveyed or professed,

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Freemasonry does not claim to offer a path to salvation by works, secret knowledge, or by any other means


Through the working tools conferred on the initiate through their Sacraments,

Freemasonry offers a path and means of self-improvement by which its members will be better enabled to reach an afterlife

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Freemasonry is not a religion because its members are not allowed to speak of other religions in open lodge

Not a requirement for religion. This is like saying Catholicism is not a religion because the Priest never speaks about Protestantism during his homily; or that Islam is not a religion because the Iman never mentions Judaism during his Friday sermon at Jummah
